Showcasing Our Local Authors!

As a Hospice and Palliative Care Nurse Practitioner, I knew the end of life from all angles. Or so I thought. Four months ago, I lost my husband. The love of my life. My soulmate. I lost my mind after he took his last breath. But not in the way you would expect. I leaned down next to his ear and whispered, "Oooh my darling." The thing is, I never called him that. I remember my head jerking back a bit after it came out. But it wasn't the first time this happened. Almost twenty years before, when my dad died, I loudly cried out "Papa!"

What?!? Where did that verbiage come from? Certainly not my conscious mind. I never called my father that. He was Daddy or Dad. Did it come from somewhere in my memory? Papa is common down south where I grew up as a term of endearment for dads and grandads. It seems possible as well that I may have heard "my darling" as a term of affection as a child.

They call it Widow Brain. It's a thing. The symptoms are forgetfulness, brain fog, irritability, exhaustion, confusion, numbness, and nausea. The brain reacts to grief trauma by flooding the brain with chemicals that decrease activity in the thinking center, increase activity in the fear center and decrease the activity in the feeling center.

When my husband died, I felt disconnected. I felt numb. The pain of losing him paralyzed me. I recognized that the words coming out of my mouth were odd but could not process why. I searched for the words to describe my feelings. Am I bereft? Forlorn? But no words seem to fit. I felt fear in the form of being overwhelmed. What would I do without him? My life made no sense now.

On top of the parts of the various parts of the brain not working so well, the thinking part and the feeling part of the brain don't communicate well with each other to provide context—disorientation. Maybe that disconnect was at play when I uttered those words that didn't make sense to me.

People smarter than me (yes, I have a therapist here on the island) say time, plus feeling the pain of loss while at the same time feeling gratitude for the life, I had with my darling husband will help my brain rewire. Darling. It's a good word.

Island Theatre invites Kitsap County playwrights—both established and aspiring—to submit original plays, no more than ten minutes in length, to Island Theatre's 11th Annual Ten-Minute Play Festival! Deadline for play submissions is Valentine's Day, February 14, 2024.

The theme for this year's festival is HUNGER. Hunger can be literal, or figurative. Unmet or satisfied. Regardless, it powers our emotions and drives our actions. Playwrights may interpret HUNGER as they wish, but the notion of HUNGER must be central to the play. In support of our theme, Island Theatre will donate 10% of ticket sales to a nonprofit agency that addresses hunger. Ten winning plays will be selected by a panel of theatre professionals and members of the Island Theatre board and will be announced in April 2024. The ten plays will be fully produced for the stage and presented in four performances at the new Buxton Center on Bainbridge Island, August 22-24, 2024.

The contest is open to all playwrights high school age and older who currently live or work in Kitsap County or who previously lived or worked in Kitsap County for a significant period.




Have You Seen This Library?

Alias Emma By Ava Glass

Emma Makepeace has barely graduated from basic training when she gets the call for her first major assignment as a spy. She must covertly travel across London, one of the world's most watched cities to bring the son of Russian dissidents into protective custody, before the Russian spies seize him. London's famous Ring of Steel has been hacked by the Russian government, so the two must cross the city without being seen by the hundreds of thousands of CCTV cameras that document every inch of the city. Traveling on foot without phones or bank cards that could reveal their location or identity, they have twelve hours to make it to safety. One misstep could get them killed. This homage to the spy craft of Ian Fleming's James Bond is a nailbiter of the first order. Great character interaction, wonderful chase scenes and a stunning ending.
