Art in the Library!



Welcome to the beautiful month of May, which brings flowers to our gardens and more art to feast your eyes. Our May artist, Jared Bartlett, offers his exhibit titled "Teanaway Banks" with an opening reception for First Friday, May 3, 5-7PM in the library meeting room.

Here is Jared's artist statement:

"Jared Bartlett, painter: In 2023 Jared relocated from an apartment in Westlake, Seattle to a log cabin on a peaceful piece of land on the bank of the Teanaway river.

Inspired by the landscape and the stones of marble, serpentine, zebra marble, and Picasso-stone found on the riverbanks, Jared painted a series of abstract works in plain air using acrylic paint and the materials provided by

nature. This includes brushes made of pine needles, leaves of Lambs Ear, driftwood, birch bark, and wood-ash.

The work contains the energy, texture, and wild striations of the land and flora that contribute to the vibrancy of nature on the bank of Teanaway."

#### I Meet Myself Every Morning

"How do I know what I think," impatiently replied to a Little Old Lady, "until I've heard what I've said!" William Makepeace Thackeray roughly estimated that "there are a thousand thoughts within a man that he does not know until he takes up a pen to write."

I take up my pen first thing every morning to write in my journal. Over four decades I've unearthed plenty more than a thousand thoughts, though very few Big Ones. Most days I merely give myself good advice on how to best deal with what appears to be my personal reality.

In these daily written reflections I follow the example of Montaigne, who on a ceiling beam in his chateau tower inscribed a mission statement for anyone who keeps a journal: Que sais je, "what do I know? Montaigne set out to know his true self, unalloyed by the tastes and ideas of others, realizing that "habituation closes the eyes of our judgment."

Marcus Aurelius, the ever-thoughtful Stoic Roman emperor, wrote regular "letters to himself" in his journals, even when he was on the battlefield. "The best revenge," he advised the writer, "is not to be like your enemy." Perhaps to calm himself when things in the Empire weren't going so well, he reminded the emperor that "things cannot touch the mind; they are external and inert; anxieties can only come from your internal judgment."

In his journals Henry David Thoreau, though writing only for himself, penned copious commentaries on how the world could be a better place, and how individuals could behave better. "We have become tools of our tools," he lamented in the mid-19th Century, and asserted that "a man is rich in proportion to the number of things he can let alone." Thoreau's daily journal jottings, apparently directed at everyone else, actually steadily clarified and refined his personal philosophy.

"Don't waste time," Thoreau sternly admonished himself in a journal entry, modestly adding "You may be damaging eternity." Neither writing in my journal nor now crafting essays just for the fun of it count for me as "wasting time." And I am serenely confident eternity will happen as planned, without my unwitting amendment.

Bainbridge is home to many distinguished and hugely popular authors. In this column, we will profile a local author each month. Many will already be favorites, but we may just introduce you to a new author whose profile will send you right to the library to pick up a new read! 
## **Own a Bit of Bainbridge Public Library History!**



The year was 1997. A two-year project of a major remodel of the library was nearly complete. But something still wasn't quite right. Under the new design, the backs of the computer monitors were facing the public. Younger folks may not remember a time when computer monitors protruded but such was the case, and the BPL Board of Directors determined a fix needed to be found. Island artist Michelle Van Slyke came up with the perfect design and was commissioned to create 10 of the simple but stunning and effective "Reading Hands."

Now that the computer monitors are flat, no camouflage is needed! With the artist's blessing, the "Reading Hands" metal sculptures are available at the Friends of the Library book sales, beginning in May.
