

"June is busting out all over".....with art! Celebrate the month with our June artist, Francene Levinson, opening her exhibit titled "Paper, Plastic and Pixels ", First Friday, June 7 , 5-7 PM in the library meeting room.



Here is the artist's description of her work:

"As an artistic individual, I continually find it satisfying to create color, form, and composition with nontraditional art materials such as: pixels, paper, and plastic. Our environment, politics, and human experience are important sources of inspiration for my art. Now, as a Techspressionist artist, I use my laptop and printer as my art studio. This technology allows me to express my inspired thoughts and emotions in the moment.

Since I enjoy creative challenges, multi-modular paper sculpture evolved naturally from my previous skills as a stone sculptor. I find that paper has great strength in multi-modular numbers and an architectural beauty that deserves to be explored and shared. Because I care about our environment, I have created sculptures with transformed recycled materials such as cardboard boxes, plastic food containers, plastic bags, and hot glue. I thoroughly enjoy changing pixels, paper, and plastic from mundane to magnificent."

Showcasing Our Local Authors - Florence Klein



Meet Florence Klein, a remarkable woman whose life journey traverses the tumultuous landscape of the Second World War, shaping her into a resilient trailblazer for generations to come. From her formative years, Florence exuded a determination that defied the norms of her time. As a child, she recognized the need to seize control of her destiny, a resolve that propelled her through seven decades of unwavering purpose and passion.

Adorned in her signature impeccable attire, Florence learned early on the importance of keeping her hat on—both figuratively and literally—as she fearlessly navigated the predominantly male spheres of finance, real estate, and business. Amidst the demands of career and family, she never wavered in pursuing her dreams, no matter how audacious they seemed.

Beyond her professional pursuits, Florence epitomized the spirit of service, dedicating herself to volunteering in state and federal prisons across the United States. From assisting prisoners in Pennsylvania with their probation and visiting the notorious ADX maximum-security prison in Colorado, her encounters with some of society's most infamous figures, including the


Boston Marathon bomber and the Oklahoma City bomber, underscored her commitment to rehabilitation and compassion.

In this candid memoir, Florence extends her wisdom to a new generation, offering invaluable insights into living a life of courage, purpose, and inclusivity in an often perplexing and harsh world. Her story serves as a beacon of hope, demonstrating that everyone possesses the potential to blaze trails and inspire others.

Trails that went from breaking barriers as one of Philadelphia's first female stockbrokers to spearheading the transformation of old factory buildings into historic condos as America's inaugural woman real estate developer.

Her altruism also knew no bounds, as evidenced by her creation of one of the earliest websites aimed at assisting seniors in need with Silver Planet.

Despite the passage of time, "Under the Hat" serves as a testament to the enduring power of self-discovery and resilience. It wasn't until the age of eighty-two that she truly embraced her identity — a poignant reminder that it's never too late to embrace one's true self and make a lasting impact on the world.




Bainbridge is home to many distinguished and hugely popular authors. In this column, we will profile a local author each month. Many will already be

Have You Seen This Library?





It is the Robinson Public Library in Armagh, Northern Ireland. Founded in 1771, Archbishop Richard Robinson founded it to display his own library and make it available for public use. It is the oldest public library in Northern Ireland. It houses 42,000 volumes as well as maps, sculpture, and paintings. In a prominent glass cabinet is Jonathan Swift's personal copy of Gulliver's Travels, 1726, with corrections in his own hand. Since 1771 it has housed the books shelved by size, with the largest books on lower shelves to better distribute weight in this second-floor library. Above the main door, carved in Greek is the library's motto "the healing place of the soul." It is a unique record of the cultural and social history of 18th century Ireland, reflecting the changing intellectual climate of Europe since 1500. The head librarian lives in the building with his wife and two small children!

Own a Bit of Bainbridge Public Library History!




The year was 1997. A two-year project of a major remodel of the library was

nearly complete. But something still wasn't quite right. Under the new design, the backs of the computer monitors were facing the public. Younger folks may not remember a time when computer monitors protruded but such was the case, and the BPL Board of Directors determined a fix needed to be found. Island artist Michelle Van Slyke came up with the perfect design and was commissioned to create 10 of the simple but stunning and effective "Reading Hands."

Now that the computer monitors are flat, no camouflage is needed! With the artist's blessing, the "Reading Hands" metal sculptures are available at the Friends of the Library book sales, beginning in May. The purchase price is \$100, with all proceeds benefiting the Bainbridge Public Library. (Reminder: FOL accepts cash or checks only.)

Books Worth Sharing



Shakespeare - The Man Who Pays the Rent By Judi Dench

Dame Judi Dench is one of the most celebrated actors of our time. In addition to BAFTAs, an Academy Award, and numerous Oliviers, she has received an OBE, a DBE, and a Companion of Honour. Full disclosure, I am a huge fan of Ms. Dench and would happily pay to hear her read the phone book! In this latest memoir, she regales us with backstage tidbits, on-stage hilarity, and thoughtful musings about the parts she has played in over twenty of Shakespeare's plays over her seven decades in the theatre. Interspersed with vignettes on audiences, critics, company spirit and rehearsal room etiquette, she serves up priceless revelations on everything from the craft of speaking in verse to her personal interpretations of some of Shakespeare's most famous scenes. The book is written in conversation with Brendan O'Hea, theater director and an Associate Artist at Shakespeare's Globe and its breezy style makes the reader feel that you are sitting at a kitchen table listening to two old friends swapping stories. You need not be a Shakespeare scholar to appreciate the deftness with which Ms. Dench discusses the characters she has played. Her sense of humor and hilarious anecdotes make her retellings of Shakespeare's stories fabulously entertaining. So much more than just another theatrical memoir, Shakespeare - the man who pays the
